ITALIAN IN 2024

We have begun implementing a contemporary pedagogical approach to Italian Language teaching called TCL, Teachers as Co-Learners. Put simply, learning a language involves actively learning new words, and knowing how to put them together for the purpose of communicating.

Language learners need to hear and use new words a lot before they retain them – up to 40 times. This is best achieved by multimodal input in the form of learning words, gestures, visuals, digital, animated cartoons, and text. This is achieved daily through short 10-minute Italian language-focused sessions at the start of every day that involve multi-modal exposure and repetition. This allows students to anchor their new language in depth and to transfer knowledge to long-term memory through interweaving and recycling across contexts.

All teachers and students at SSPP are co-learners of the Italian language and are supported by; a proficient speaking Language Teacher who supports the learning journey, and access to structured language resources to ensure the successful implementation of TCL. Our Italian teacher, Signora Mazzone meets with teachers weekly to teach them new words and phrases and provides coaching and resources for teachers to with use daily. gestures are learnt along the words to support acquisition, retention, and recall. Signora Mazzone will have an additional 20 minute lesson with each class once a week to model how we can use these words and phrases to speak to one another in Italian and present additional vocabulary and cultural information.

The TCL program allows students to make explicit literacy connections between their L1 (first language) and L2 (additional language). In participating in this innovative program, students demonstrate an increase in language acquisition and retention, higher levels of student engagement and confidence, and success in producing the target language spontaneously.

At SsPP, the learning of languages (Italian) will be strategically implemented across the school in daily, short sessions. Our language approach at SsPP supports a shift from isolation to an integration model of learning. Students engage in 10 minutes of functional language immersion at the start of each day and an additional weekly lesson with Signora Mazzone.

Our staff engage with each other daily to ensure they are also learning alongside our students. In support of the partnership with CECV 'Languages – Now were talking!' strategy.

We have four strategic drivers for language education:

- 1. Realising the potential of language learning to build students' skills across the curriculum
- 2. Developing powerful language teaching
- 3. Supporting deep language learning
- 4. Ensuring the quality, rigour, and sustainability of our languages (Italian) program.

NAPLAN Information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national proficiency standards.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Online NAPLAN tests are designed to provide precise results and are engaging for students. The tests are tailored (or adaptive) which means that each test presents questions that may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses. This helps students remain engaged with the assessment.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for all Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students. ACARA supports inclusive testing, so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, and our series of videos where parents/ carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.



What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests; however, it is not necessary for parents/carers to do this. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

How is my child's performance reported?

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against proficiency standards. There is a standard for each assessment area at each year level. Proficiency standards provide clear information on student achievement. They are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected for the child at the time of NAPLAN testing, based mainly on what has been taught in previous years of schooling. Student achievement is shown against 4 levels of proficiency: Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may not have the capacity to complete the tests in a shorter time frame.

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 13 March 2024 and finishes on Monday 25 March 2024. Schools will schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

DROP OFF & PICK UP ROUTINE

Thank you to all parents and carers for your patience this afternoon at pick up time. We are doing our best to continue our routine that enables all children to get picked up as safely and quickly as possible.

Our routine that is outlined below:

- <u>PREP / I</u> students and their older siblings will be dropped off and picked up from the <u>main gate</u> at the front entrance. Entry to class is through the Room 2 gate.
- Year 2/3 students and their older siblings will be dropped off and picked up from the <u>main gate</u> at the front entrance. Entry to the classroom will be through Room 8 and the class will be escorted to the front gate at dismissal.
- Year 4 and Year 5/6 students will be dropped off and picked up from the <u>lower gate</u> at the staff carpark. Both classes will be using the external stairs to enter and exit the classrooms. Safe walking up and down the stairs is always expected.

This routine sees a relatively even distribution of numbers exiting the gates in the safest way. Staff are on duty to ensure all students are collected safely.

VERY IMPORTANT TO KNOW FOR PICK UP AND DROP OFF ZONES—PARENTS MUST STAY IN THEIR CAR

Please adhere to our requests with regards to the use of the zones directly out the front of the school and at the lower carpark gate.

- Cars drive into the zone to drop off or to pick up students only. During peek school times, these are not used as parking areas.
- For the area at the main entrance— Students will only be permitted to exit the school gate to get into a car when the car is in one of the first 3 car places—where the gutter is painted yellow.
- If your child needs assistance to get into the car and to be restrained, then parents/carers must park in an allocated parking area and walk to the gate to collect their child.
- Drivers move safely away from the zones as soon as possible to ensure a smooth flow of cars and safer delivery of students to vehicles.
- Please do not make U turns into or out off the drop off/pick up zones.
- Please do not stop across the path of our school crossing, the staff carpark, nor neighbours' drive ways, particularly
 in Hamilton Cres.
- Parents are not to enter or park in the staff car park for drop off or pick up.
- Families are asked to communicate this with any other family or friends who may drop off or pick up your children.

3.2 MACS Enrolment Agreement

Concessional Fees for 2024

Eligibility for Concessional School Fees

The following families are strongly encouraged to apply for concessional school fees:

- Any family holding an HCC and eligible for CSEF.
- Any family experiencing severe financial hardship.
- Any family holding a DVA Gold Card.
- Any family identified as refugees and holding an ImmiCard.
- Any family required to relocate their (Australian resident) child to St. Michael's Catholic Primary School, North Melbourne, due to the child requiring long term medical treatment at The Royal Children's Hospital, Melbourne. Pro-rata concession is provided for part-year attendance. An annual statutory declaration is required to confirm eligibility.
- HSS who attend a MACS primary school on a part time basis, who meet any of the criteria detailed above.

Applications for concessional school fees must be made on the Ss Peter & Paul's approved form. Forms are available from the Office. Applications for Concessional Fees must be made on a yearly basis and is applicable only for the 2024 School Fees and Levies. Please note concession is not given for school camp.
